Foggers for sale.

The club has purchased a small number of foggers for members to purchase. Foggers can cool a shadehouse considerably in extreme heat conditions and prevent heat damage to your plants. They are somewhat difficult to purchase commercially, as a large minimum number of units has been required to be ordered.

They are available from our treasurer or trading table in packs of 5 foggers. Cost is \$15 for the five.

They are attached to 12mm poly pipe via a barb in the fogger. Each fogger produces a very fine mist and cools the area and provides a much needed humidity boost. They use approximately 5 litres of water per hour, depending on your water pressure. Operating them for even a few minutes each hour helps the plants in hot conditions.

They are very easy to install, and are best automatically operated by a timer or thermostat

Below is an article about a Gentleman who changed Orchid culture world wide. Many older growers will know a little about him. Newer growers are unlikely to know much about him. Hopefully after reading this article, you will appreciate what he has done. We have lots to thank him for.


Don Wimber: Reflections and Observations by Andy Easton. GAWLER DISTRICT ORCHID CLUB INC.



When Don Wimber passed away at a relatively young age, the modern orchid world lost a seminal figure. Modest almost to a fault, yet knowledgeable in depth and breadth to a degree his friends could scarcely comprehend, Don Wimber (1930 to 1997) was the scientific shaper of today's orchids. As a generous and trusted friend of 25 years, I was saddened to be suddenly cut off from this immense reservoir of orchid knowledge and wise counsel. This sense of great loss was surely felt by the widest orchid community; for there must scarcely be an orchid enthusiast in the world whose collection does not number at least some Wimberinfluenced creations.

Don hiking in Oregon, US, 1996

At Claremont College in Pomona, California, Don came to the attention of Samuel B. Mosher of Signal Oil Company fame. Mosher funded Don's doctorate study and later established Dos Pueblos Orchid Company in Goleta, California. In the company's first fabulous colour catalogue in 1956, the caption under a picture of a young, crew-cut man with a microscope introduced "Dr. Donald E. Wimber, our Cytogeneticist." Already Don was becoming influential in the booming new cymbidium industry. In the early 1950s, he and the manager of Dos Pueblos, Kermit Hernlund, went to Europe with an open check book and instructions to source the finest cymbidiums they could. From that foray came famous-name cymbidiums like Cymbidium Rosanna 'Pinkie', FCC/RHS, Cymbidium Nam Khan FCC/RHS, Cymbidium Babylon 'Castle Hill', FCC/RHS, Cymbidium Balkis 'Perfection' and the mythical Cymbidium Candeur 'Dos Pueblos'. Don recalled they spent nearly \$300,000 for a group of plants that scarcely filled a corner of one of the large greenhouses at Dos Pueblos.

In that ground-breaking colour catalogue, the statement was made that "chromosome numbers of all parent plants are determined before hybridization is attempted." Guess who was doing all the chromosome counting? It would be fair to say Don's willingness to count chromosomes never flagged, though in later life he would plead for a respite from counting odontoglossums with their small chromosomes and high numbers.

There were nearly 70 seedling crosses offered in the first Dos Pueblos catalog and they read like a who's-who of quality cymbidiums. The remake of Cymbidium Jungfrau, from which the incomparable Cym. Jungfrau 'Dos Pueblos' arose, was described thus — "we have remade this famous cross of H.G. Alexander using an uncommonly free-flowering Eagle." Little wonder that Cym. Jungfrau 'Dos Pueblos' is still regarded as the production cymbidium without peer. Other industry hallmarks lurking as seedlings in the catalog were crosses that would carry names like San Francisco, Ann Green. Etta Barlow, Samarkand and California.

When Don and I visited Japan in February 1996 he reminisced about his first visit in 1956. On that trip, Hernlund and Don were accompanied by Henry Tanaka, who worked at Dos Pueblos and who would be their translator. Tanaka would later achieve recognition for his own skill in miniature cymbidium hybrids but on this trip his first job was to source the widest range of miniature oriental cymbidium species. A key visit was to Dr. Yoshio Nagano, a medical doctor in Tokyo who was the first Japanese to hybridize oriental species with traditional cymbidium hybrids. Lunch was delivered by a bicycling noodle boy and, some 40 years later, Don contrasted this 19th-century quaintness with the bustle and efficiency of modern Tokyo.

It is probably fair to say that Kermit Hernlund kept a wary eye on his upwardly mobile cytogeneticists, and Don eventually felt it was time to move on from Dos Pueblos. He did some intensive research on radiation mutations in New York and at Cambridge University before joining the faculty in the Department of Biology at the University of Oregon in Eugene. You will not read it in the texts, but it is safe to say that either Everest McDade at Rivermont Orchids or Don Wimber was the first person to successfully clone orchids. Morel got the credit but those in the scientific community know where the breakthrough was made.




As a spinoff from the first hybrid between an oriental and a traditional species, Cymbidium Minuet (pumilum x insigne), Don was alerted to a problem of almost total infertility. From this came his experiments with colchicine, a chromosome-doubling mutagenic chemical, and a report to the 5th World Orchid Conference at Long Beach in 1966 that set the standards for chromosome doubling in cymbidiums.

Don had a close working relationship with Emma Menninger, another famous cymbidium breeder of the 1950s and '60s. From this association, he received a steady flow of diploid cymbidiums for colchicine conversion. Famous diploids like Cymbidium Rincon 'Clarisse,' Cymbidium Claudona 'Rajah', Cymbidium Doris Aurea 'Cardinal' and Cymbidium Baltic AM/RHS. were converted initially and followed by Cymbidium parishii 'Sanderae', Cymbidium Solana Beach 'St. Francis' and Cymbidium Peter Pan 'Greensleeves' in the 1960s. Cymbidium Peter Pan 'Greensleeves' 4n was one of Don's greatest joys, a mule restored to full fertility and, in its tetraploid state, a progenitor of a new race of ultra-early-blooming, warmth-tolerant miniature cymbidiums.

In the mid-1980s, fresh from his successes in converting paphiopedilums to higher ploidy levels, Don had the time to embark on new orchid projects. However, his availability was overlooked by the United States' orchid community. It still saddens me to realize the opportunity was lost, but thankfully Alan Moon and the Eric Young Orchid Foundation snapped up Don and his dreams for the future. The foundation became Don's sponsor for his research through the American Orchid Society Research Committee in 1980.

In 1986, the trustees of the foundation invited Don to continue his research on the Isle of Jersey, and the results were nothing short of astonishing. Through his vision for creating tetraploid phragmipediums, there is now a cascade of new hybrids, amazing in their shape, color and texture, that stand testament to a man with vision.

The Eric Young Orchid Foundation and Committee showed their appreciation by naming a cross in his honor, Phragmipedium Don Wimber (Eric Young x besseae). Alan feels it is the foundation's finest phragmipedium hybrid to date, considering a well-grown plant has many bright-orange flowers on a branched spike.

This quiet and unassuming scientist received the highest recognition in every sphere of his orchid involvement: The AOS Gold Medal of Achievement, the Cymbidium Society Gold Medal and, fittingly. the Westonbirt Medal from the Royal Horticultural Society for his outstanding contributions to orchid knowledge.

More importantly, Don enjoyed the love and respect of all whose paths he crossed. The New Zealand Maori have a saying for when someone great dies. They speak of a mighty tree falling to the forest floor and tiny seedlings, partially blinded by the sudden light, struggling to establish themselves and grow up in an attempt to fill the space that has been emptied. This is how we felt when Don passed.

The lip was dark red. This plant was a very eyecatching specimen. Well done to Michael and Oui for growing and presenting this plant.

First Division Kiwi Davenport "Flying High" (Flame Hawk x devoninum . Registered 2004)

5 flower spikes in a 170mm pot. This plant is intermediate size, and flowers were dark pink. The lip was red going to white in the throat.
