Presidents Message February 2022

This year, and only for Ben's plants, and perhaps in his memory, that rule will not apply and his plants can be shown at our nightly shows, also the Winter and Spring shows. Unfortunately, because of his illness, most of his plants were not shown last year, and it would be great if one of his plants did win something this year.

The SAROC situation has now settled down, with the South Australian Orchid Fair to be held on the 11th and 12th June at the Campbelltown Civic Centre. More details to follow as the time gets closer.

A little about the plants exhibited at the February meeting

They were grown by Sylvia and Elayne, two of the members of the beginner's group. Well done ladies.

These plants came via a donation from another member, of a huge specimen plant of it, the species cymbidium dayanum. At the beginner's group meeting, a couple of years back, we divided the plant, and all present received a plant or two to take home (free).

The two plants exhibited were well grown, and had more spikes coming, which could be out for the March meeting

dayanum (species plants are always spelled in lower case), is a very easy to grow cymbidium, usually flowering very early in the season. It multiple spikes easily, and quickly builds into a spectacular, specimen plant. Refer to page 9 for photos of a larger plant.

There are alba forms of it available, also a pink form.

Perhaps we need to ask Sylvia and Elayne, how to grow it?

Below is an extract from the Cymbidium Orchid Society of Victoria web site

Cymbidium dayanum easily produces specimen plants and can produce several spikes from each bulb. The pendulous spikes are capable of carrying up to twenty flowers of around 40mm across. While the flowers are quite starry and taller than they are wide, they are most attractive, being coloured ivory-white with broad red mid lines in petals and sepals. The labellum is almost totally red with a white centre bordered in yellow. *Cym. dayanum* is not a large-growing plant and a specimen can easily be achieved in a 200mm pot.

Three colour forms exist for this species – the type, a solid red form (classified as *Cym. dayanum var. angustifolium*) and the alba form (*Cym. dayanum f. album*, which is a clean ivory to cream colour). The red type has the longest-lived flowers, whereas the alba form has the shortest.

It is one of the heat-tolerant species and will readily cope with the hot Australian summers as long as it is not allowed to get sunburnt and is given plenty of water during the warmer months of the year.

The Ben Knobben plant auction

Our club spent a lot of time to assist Chris Knobben sell off the collection of plants put together over many years by Ben

Our President Graham Fear offered our services to sell the collection, after Chris indicated that she could not continue to grow the plants

Below is how we went about setting up and conducting the auction.

In early December, a group of members attended Ben's house, to help divide the plants needing dividing. Due to Ben's illness, he was unable to do this as he wanted to do. Thank you to Moss Bray for the donation of some bark to help get the job done. The group divided about 25 or so plants, creating more plants and some backbulbs.

After Ben passed away, a group of members met to catalogue the plants and equipment. There were about 200 plants, growing well in pots ranging from 7 inch to 10 inches, and a considerable amount of growing equipment (pots, fertilizer, insecticides etc)

It was decided to photograph each pot, and the label in the pot. It would have been very time consuming to manually write all the plant names, then transfer them to a computer file. Two members numbered each pot, one starting at 01, and going towards number 99. Another member started at 100 and progressed past 200. We took photographs of all the pots, and labels. We then renumbered all the photograph files, generated by the camera, to coincide with the number on the pot.

Sue Hollands generously offered to produce a Word document on her computer, with the photograph of each and every plant, together with the plant name. This was a huge task, made even harder because of some spelling mistakes on the labels and some labels being rather faded. Sue searched the Orchid database OrchidWiz, to try and correctly name all the plants. Great Job Sue.

Several members proof read the document, and corrected it if necessary. The catalogue was sent to all our members with internet details registered with the club. It was forwarded on to many other clubs and orchid growers, here and interstate, and even overseas. Two forms of the catalogue was produced, one with just a list of plant names, with pot size displayed. A second form, showed a photograph of the actual plant being offered. Anyone viewing it on a computer, saw the pictures in colour. The day of the auction was a bit of a worry. COVID restrictions limited the number of people in a house to no more than 50. Planning was put in place to conduct the auction in front of the house (in the street) if numbers were excessive. Forty two people registered to bid.

The auction was a tremendous success. The Auctioneer, Mick Talbot was sensational, and kept the process moving along quickly. John Howard recorded all successful bids, Graham Fear assisted when necessary, and various members assisted with collecting moneys, and collecting plants as bidding finished. It was a real team effort, and very well done. Congratulations to all who assisted, and there were many. I know that Chris Knobben was extremely pleased with the whole process. All plants, and most of the equipment was sold on the day. All that remains is for a clean up of the shed. The shade houses will remain in place to give Chris some privacy from neighbouring properties.

It will be interesting to see how well the new owners of the plants grow them. Hopefully we will see many of them shown this coming flowering season.



This is a simple device to prevent rodent baits from getting wet
Use a short length of stormwater pipe, with a cap at one end. Make a small cut with a saw in
the pipe about 10cm from one end, and insert a small piece of flat steel. This raises the cap
end of the pipe and stops water flowing into it. Put any baits behind the steel section, near the
cap. Rodents will check it out and feed on the dry baits. Keep baits in it at all times, and you
will control rodents. I will bring a sample to the March meeting.

We are always looking for good quality plants in our displays, so you are encouraged to display them even if you do not enter them competitively.

The same rule applies to showing plants at monthly meetings, so keep good records of purchase date.

Congratulations to the Committee for allowing any plants bought at the Ben Knobben auction to be shown before the six month qualifying period

Hopefully we will see lots of Ben's plants displayed this year Ben was unable to exhibit plants last year due to illness Whisper is that he would have won some major prizes if he had shown them


